Key facts

- ANZAC stands for Australian and New Zealand Army Corps.
- In 1915, ANZAC soldiers landed at Gallipoli in the First World War.
- Many were killed in the hard, costly campaign.
- ANZAC Day, 25 April, honours those who served and died.

- Dawn service — an early-morning ANZAC ceremony.

ANZAC Day is a solemn time to remember the soldiers who served and died, especially at Gallipoli.

Shared with Australia

New Zealand and Australia share ANZAC Day, marking it together each 25 April with dawn services.
